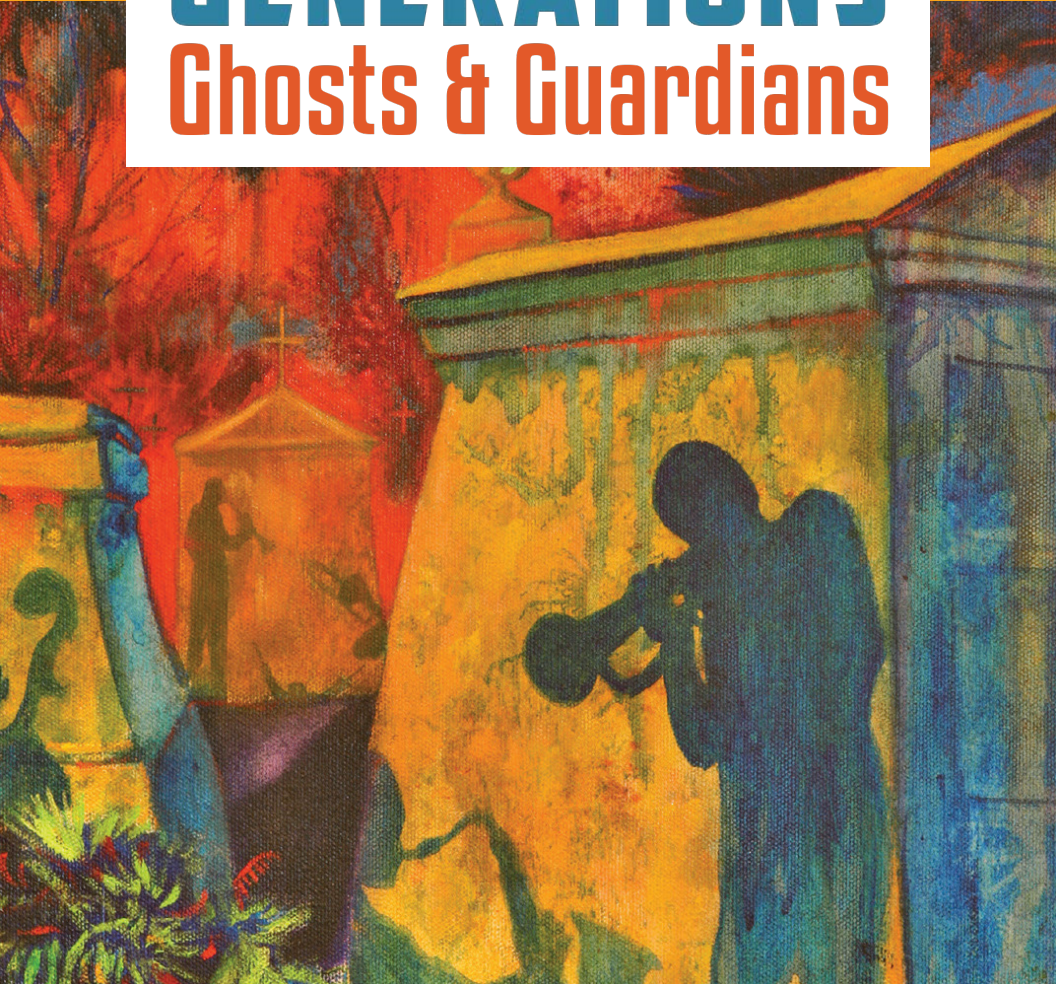

A SECOND LINE PARADE: Join Us in Closing the Conference with a Joyful New Orleans Ritual



For centuries, citizens of New Orleans have taken to the streets to mark significant events. In all seasons and parts of the city, jazz funerals and parades known as second lines fill the streets with dance and music. A second line, traditionally led by a brass band, commemorates occasions from weddings to funerals to the end of a conference.

On Saturday, April 21st, we will meet in the front of the Intercontinental New Orleans to join the Kinfolk Brass Band in a second line parade beginning at 6:15 PM. With police escort, the musicians and conference-goers will gather and move through the streets to nearby Lafayette Square Park and back to the hotel, celebrating our conference and time together in New Orleans.

Early origins of second lines can be traced to West African dance circles and, later, to the influence of slaves on New Orleans processions, including a history of rejoicing at death through music. Military funeral parade practices of the 19th century are another

source of influence on the development of the second line. To honor the deceased, a brass band along with friends and families typically comprised the first, or main, line of the parade, while the rest who joined made up the second line. By the beginning of the next century, funerals also became a forum for the performance of jazz. Over the years, the second line further developed its own distinct identity separate from funerals. Second lines have become opportunities to traverse neighborhoods together, making stops at homes and other important locations. Today, second lines are a prominent tradition in their own right, bringing together communities through dancing, rejoicing, and revelry. We are excited to hold one for Division 39 in New Orleans that celebrates psychoanalysis and the close of our annual spring meeting.

Continuing Education Information for 2018

The Division of Psychoanalysis is approved by the American Psychological Association (APA) to sponsor continuing education (CE) for psychologists. Division 39 maintains responsibility for these programs and their content. Wednesday Master Classes and Spring Meeting programs are open to all mental health professionals, and participants may receive CE credit for attending these programs. Participants from professions other than psychology should consult with their respective licensing boards regarding the acceptance of APA-approved Certificates of Attendance as documentation of CE. For programs sixty minutes in duration or longer, one credit is awarded for each hour of CE activity, with additional quarter-increments of CE credit awarded beyond one hour; for example, attending a one-hour-and-fifty-minute program will yield 1.75 CE credits. 50-minute programs are not available for CE credit.

Wednesday Master Classes require registration separate from general registration for the Spring Meeting and are offered for additional fees. At the conclusion of Master Classes, participants will receive a paper certificate of attendance upon completing a paper evaluation form.

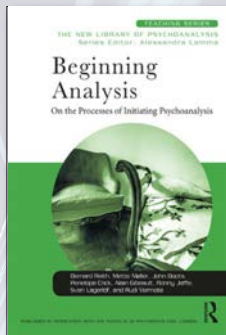
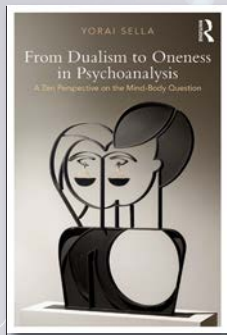
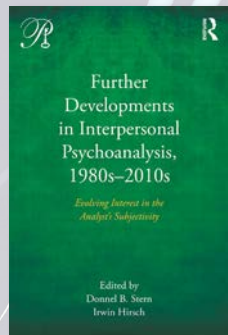
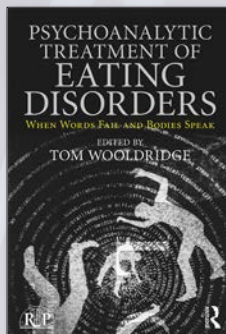
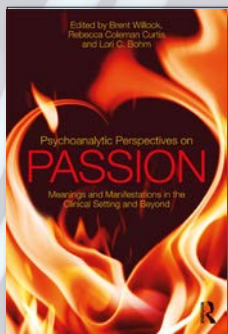
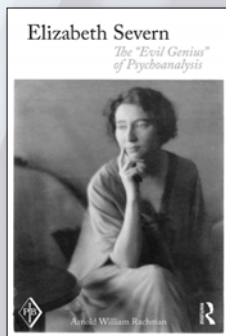
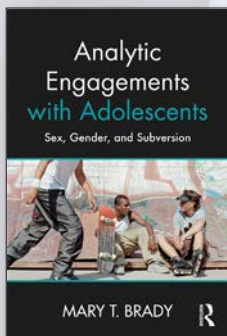
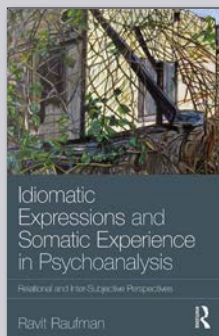
Each CE-eligible Spring Meeting program is identified by a letter/number code (e.g. TH-1, FR-3, SA-5, SU-2) indicating the day of the presentation and its order in that day's schedule. For all CE-eligible programs, there is no partial credit for attending only a portion of an eligible program. Attendance of CE-eligible Spring Meeting programs will be confirmed using a scanning system. Participants will be required to have the

barcode on their badges scanned both at the start of the program session and as they leave at the conclusion of the session. To receive a Certificate of Attendance for any CE-eligible program, it is necessary to (1) register for the Spring Meeting, (2) attend the entire program, and (3) submit evaluations of each program through Express Evaluations, the Division's online evaluation and certificate service. Please note our transition away from paper evaluations to online evaluations! Instructions about using Express Evaluations or any additional procedures will be available at the Registration Desk during the conference.

Division 39 is committed to accessibility and non-discrimination in its CE activities and will conduct these in conformity with the American Psychological Association's Ethical Principles for Psychologists. Presenters of CE-eligible programs will address, whether during the program or via a list of references, the utility of the presentation content and the basis for their statements about this utility as well as the limitations and risks (common and most severe) associated with the program content. Presenters and participants are asked to honor the need for privacy and confidentiality throughout these programs. If program content becomes emotionally distressing, participants are encouraged to process these feelings during discussion periods. 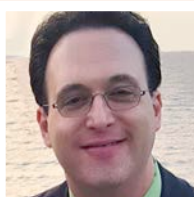
LEADERSHIP AWARD

Frank Summers, PhD, ABPP

Frank Summers, PhD, ABPP, is a professor of Clinical Psychiatry and the Behavioral Sciences, Feinberg School of Medicine, Northwestern University, and Supervising and Training Analyst, Chicago Institute for Psychoanalysis and The Chicago Center for Psychoanalysis.

A former president of Division 39 and Section IX, he initiated and has remained co-chair of the Division 39 Scholars Program which has exposed many young clinicians to psychoanalytic ideas. His other leadership positions in the Division include service on the Board of Representatives in a variety of capacities, service on the Ethics Committee, and serving as Divisional Advocate for Social Justice. Dr. Summers has been part of the successful movement to change APA policy to ban psychologists from working in Guantanamo and other illegal detention settings.

Winner of several local and national awards including The Hans Strupp Award for Contributions to Psychoanalysis and The Distinguished Educator Award of the International Federation of Psychoanalytic Education, Dr. Summers has written more than 60 papers and book chapters and published four books the most recent of which, *The Psychoanalytic Vision: The Experiencing Subject, Transcendence, and The Therapeutic Process*, won the Gradiva Award as the best psychoanalytic book of 2013. Dr. Summers is in the private practice of psychoanalysis and psychoanalytic psychotherapy in Chicago, Illinois.

Scott Pytluk, PhD, ABPP

Scott D. Pytluk, PhD, ABPP, is Professor of Clinical Psychology at the Illinois School of Professional Psychology at Argosy University, Chicago where he coordinates the school's Psychoanalytic Concentration and teaches many courses including "Lesbian/Gay/Bisexual/Transgender Psychology" and "Psychoanalysis

& Difference." Additionally, he has acted as the faculty sponsor for the campus's LGBT student group for many years. Dr. Pytluk maintains a downtown Chicago practice in individual psychotherapy and psychoanalysis as well as couples work and consultation. He has worked extensively with LGBT-identified individuals in psychoanalytic treatment and was proud to receive the "Friend of the Chapter" award from the Chicago chapter of Tri-S (Society for the Second Self, an organization for heterosexual male cross-dressers and their spouses and partners) for his facilitation of community and educational outreach about gender identity. Dr. Pytluk is in the end phase of formal training in psychoanalysis at the Chicago Center for Psychoanalysis where he is currently on the Curriculum Committee and formerly served as a candidate member of the Board of Directors. Dr. Pytluk is in his second term as Member-At-Large on the Board of Directors of Division 39 and just ended his tenure of more than a decade as co-chair of the Division's Sexualities & Gender Identities Committee. He writes and presents on topics such as gay-affirmative psychoanalytic theory and therapy, teaching at the graduate level about issues of diversity and difference in psychoanalysis, clinical supervision, and ethnic identity.

Lewis Aron, PhD, is the Director of the New York University Postdoctoral Program in Psychotherapy and Psychoanalysis. He has served as President of the Division of Psychoanalysis (39) of the American Psychological Association; founding President of the International Association for Relational Psychoanalysis and Psychotherapy (IARPP); founding

President of the Division of Psychologist-Psychoanalysts of the New York State Psychological Association (NYSPA). He is the co-founder and co-chair of the Sándor Ferenczi Center at the New School for Social Research, an Honorary Member of the William Alanson White Psychoanalytic Society, and Adjunct Professor, School of Psychology, Interdisciplinary Center (IDC) Herzliya, Israel. He is board certified in Psychoanalysis from the American Board of Professional Psychology (ABPP); a Fellow of the American Board of Psychoanalysis (FABP); the American Psychological Association (APA) & the American Board & Academy of Psychoanalysis. He is a member of the American Psychoanalytic Association (APsaA) and of the International Psychoanalytical Association (IPA). He was one of the founders, and is an Associate Editor of Psychoanalytic Dialogues and is a series co-editor of the Relational Perspectives Book Series, Routledge, and a Fellow of the College of the International Journal of Psychoanalysis (2016-2020). Dr. Aron is author and editor of numerous journal articles and books including, *A Meeting of Minds; A Psychotherapy for the People* (with Karen Starr), and most recently, *Dramatic Dialogue* (with Galit Atlas). He is well known for study/reading groups both in NYC and live on Skype around the world.

Diana Diamond, PhD

Diana Diamond, PhD, is Professor in the Doctoral Program in Clinical Psychology at the City University of New York, Adjunct Clinical Professor at New York University Postdoctoral Program in Psychotherapy and Psychoanalysis, and Adjunct Assistant Clinical Professor of Psychiatry at the Weill Medical College of Cornell University, where she

is also a senior fellow in the Personality Disorders Institute (PDI). She has helped to develop Transference Focused Psychotherapy (TFP), an evidence-based psychoanalytic object relations approach to treating personality disorders, and has conducted research in change in attachment, mental representation, and mentalization over the course of TFP. She has also published extensively on the theory and treatment of personality disorders, the relevance of attachment theory and research to psychoanalysis, gender and psychoanalysis, and the application of psychoanalytic theory to the understanding of narrative and symbolism in cinema. She has co-authored and co-edited several other books, including most recently, *Attachment and Sexuality* (Taylor & Francis, 2007), *A Clinical Guide to Treating Narcissistic Disorders: A Transference Focused Psychotherapy* (Guilford Press, forthcoming), and *Cinematic Reflections on the Legacy of the Holocaust: Psychoanalytic Perspective* (Taylor and Francis, Routledge, forthcoming). She is the recipient of several awards including the inaugural International Society for Transference Focused Psychotherapy (ISTFP) Research Award (2014), the JAPA award for the best paper of the year (2009) and is on the Editorial Boards of a number of journals including *Psychoanalytic Psychology*, the *Journal of Couple and Family Psychoanalysis*, and *Psychoanalytic Inquiry*. A graduate of the NYU Postdoctoral Program in Psychotherapy and Psychoanalysis, and the Socio-analytic Training Program in Organizational Consultation at IPTAR, she has a private practice of psychoanalysis and psychoanalytic psychotherapy with individuals, couples and families.

Black Children in the Eye of the Storm

During its three hundred and fifty year history in the United States, White racism has metastasized and is described by Rustin (1991) to be one of the most destructive and powerful forms of social categorizations and its recent staged appearance in Charlottesville, Virginia, as well as the president's inept response, give no credence to the illusion of a "post racial society." This keynote paper will attempt to demonstrate how the legacy of enslaved children remains embedded in the very DNA of our society and continues to plague the lives of African American children and functions as a powerful agent in the generational transmission of their historical trauma. Kovel reported a similar conclusion in his study of White racism when he stated that, "The power of this psychosocial organization is so great that it can enter into the evolution of the psyche."

He is the founding editor of the *Journal of Infant, Child, and Adolescent Psychotherapy* and co-editor of the two-volume book, *The Psychology of Black Boys and Adolescents*. He is a senior adjunct professor of psychology at the Derner Institute of Advanced Psychological Studies at Adelphi University and Director of the Postgraduate Program in Child and Adolescent Psychotherapy, a clinical supervisor at the National Institute for Psychotherapies, and visiting faculty and Honorary Member at the Institute for Psychoanalytic Training and Research (IPTAR). He is a retired school psychologist and the former Regional Director of the New Hope Guild Centers of Brooklyn. He has published and presented on the generational trauma among African Americans and presented widely on topics effecting Black male youth. He is an active member of the Research Council of the New York City Young men's Initiative and the chairman of the board for The Harlem Family Institute: a Multicultural Psychoanalytic Training Institute.

RESEARCH AWARD: What Does Research Tell Us About Narcissistic Disorders

This paper will focus on new approaches to psychoanalytic psychotherapy with individuals with narcissistic psychopathology who have long been recognized as posing formidable challenges to their clinicians. All theoretical schools are in agreement that individuals with narcissistic disorders possess a heightened vulnerability in the sense of self, for which the typical narcissistic presentation (e.g., grandiosity, exploitativeness, entitlement) compensates. Whether the grandiose self of these patients is expressed overtly in self-aggrandizing behavior or covertly in hidden grandiose fantasies, the patients' difficulties allowing for a healthy dependency upon and attachment to the therapist, as well as their difficulties tolerating interpretive work that requires a degree of objectivity and reflection, pose significant technical challenges. For the past 20 years, a group of psychoanalytic clinicians and clinical researchers at the Personality Disorders Institute (PDI) at Weill Medical Center of Cornell University have been working to develop an evidence-based psychoanalytically-oriented psychotherapy, Transference Focused Psychotherapy (TFP) based on object relations theory, for individuals with a range of personality disorders at different levels of severity, including narcissistic disorders. This paper will present some recent refinements of TFP technique to more effectively treat patients with different levels of severity of narcissistic pathology. These clinical formulations have been informed by research on patients with severe narcissistic pathology (co-morbid borderline and narcissistic disorders) from three international samples of personality disordered patients in TFP. Our findings suggest that TFP is successful not only in reducing drop-out and improving symptomatology, but also in changing aspects of personality organization such as the capacity for mentalization and the level of attachment organization in individuals with narcissistic disorders (Clarkin et al, 2007; Doering et al., 2010; Levy et al, 2006). In addition, we have found that individuals with narcissistic disorders are characterized by distinctive attachment patterns including dismissing devaluation of attachment relationships, preoccupation with unresolved anger about early attachment experiences, or oscillations between these two contradictory states of mind with respect to attachment, which helps us to understand the complex transferences and resistances that make these patients so challenging to treat. Case material will be presented to illustrate both how our understanding of attachment substrate of severe narcissistic disorders has contributed to our modifications of TFP technique to more successfully engage and treat patients with severe narcissistic disorders.

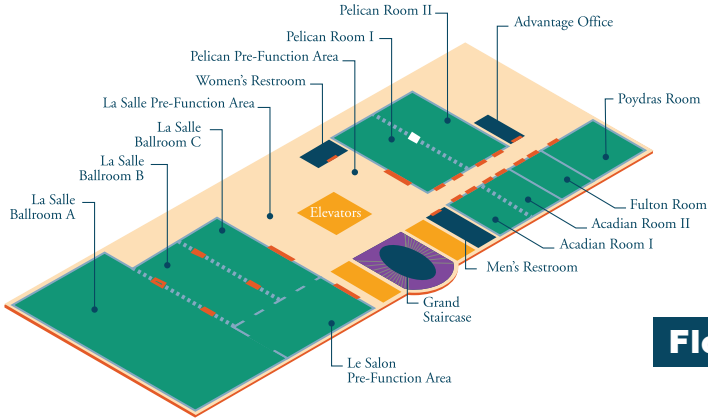

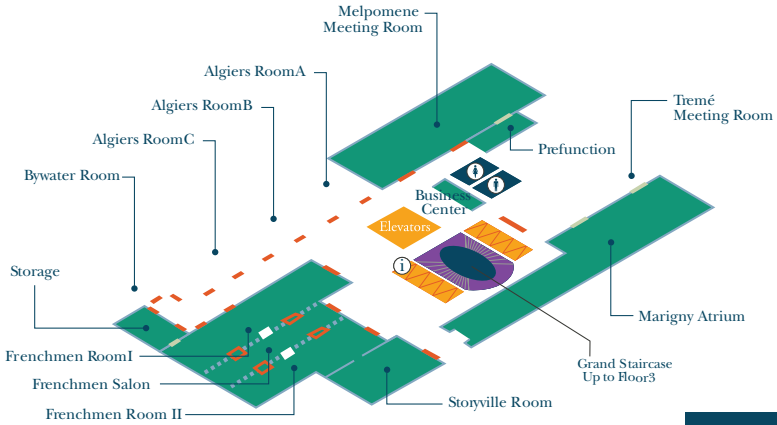

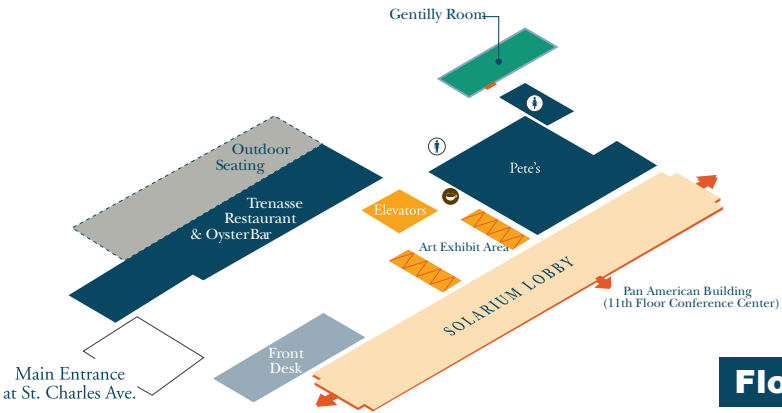
